# Description

These masks represent the Lightning Serpent, a being unique to Nuu-chah-nulth (Nootka) art and dance. The Lightning Serpent is often associated with the thunderbird and is described as the harpoon of the thunderbird. The thunderbird is often depicted holding a harpoon that is shaped like a lightning bolt. The harpoon is a critically important weapon used by Nuu-chah-nulth (Nootka) whale hunters. Lightning Serpent masks are worn on top of the head at a slight upward angle. They are used in matched

pairs, representing a male and a female.
