



## Potlatch Figure

### Date

1880-1895

### Primary Maker

Kwakwaka'wakw (Kwakiutl)

### Medium

Red cedar, paint, iron nails

### Description

This representation of an important leader or honored ancestor was prominently displayed at potlatches. These figures affirmed a chief's claims to hunting and fishing rights and his privileges to own prestigious masks and rattles. This figure wears a cedar bark headring, a symbol of chiefly status, and holds a copper, a item of wealth. His upwardly pointing index finger may imply his elevated status.
