Wool cloth, silk binding, glass beads, cotton, thread

### Description

In the early 1800s, Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) women began to offer beaded bags with floral and abstract imagery for sale to non-Natives, particularly travelers and tourists who visited Niagara Falls. Both the end of the War of 1812 and the opening of the Erie Canal in upstate New

York in 1825 contributed to the dynamics of this new activity. Although the majority of bags were sold, Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) women wore the purses to accompany the beaded finery of their skirts, leggings and moccasins. Such may be the case for the bag with the unusual imagery of a bird which was probably a vision or dream-inspired creation.
