Description

Dolls have long been central to Arctic cultural traditions. Some dolls were made as a mothers gift to her child, some by young girls themselves as a way to learn proper sewing skills. Creating doll cloths was a valuable learning experience as a girl would learn to prepare the materials and sewing the pieces together. Dolls were also made for trade and sale to non-Natives. The parka is essential to Arctic clothing and provided physical protection from the cold. This Eskimo doll is wearing a summer parka made

out of ground squirrel fur and mukluks. Medium/Materials: Wolf fur, hide, wood, woolen yarn, pigment, thread; Marks: White tag in black mechanical ink: "C-NC-38-72"; Under right proper foot in black mechanical ink: "3872";
